Field Trip 1: Nichols Arboretum. Cost - \$20.00

Departure Time: 1:30 pm
The University of Michigan established Nichols Arboretum in 1907. The site boasts 123 acres of beautiful natural landscapes near the heart of Ann Arbor, Michigan. This field trip will take the form of an educational, ecological walking tour of the Arboretum. The tour will also examine the Arboretum's restoration practices and relationships to surrounding communities.

Growing Hope, located in Ypsilanti, Michigan, works to foster an equitable and sustainable local food system in which people grow, sell, buy, prepare, and eat nourishing food. Those participating in this field trip will get an educational tour of the farm. Following the tour, trip participants will engage in service activities on the farm.
